
OFFICE OF STUDENT ACTIVITIES 2025-2026 ANNUAL REPORT

To promote the social, personal, and professional development of students by providing opportunities for growth and networking.

The Office of Student Activities (OSA) staff works diligently to ensure that students are actively involved and engaged. Our ongoing goal is to help every student find their niche—providing them with a sense of belonging and comfort, whether through participation in a student organization, Fraternity/Sorority Life, or by attending an OSA-sponsored event. The Office of Student Activities supports student organizations, campus programming, the Student Government Association, Fraternity/Sorority Life, and manages both Quintyne Hall and Ram-Bo.

STUDENT ORGANIZATIONS BY THE NUMBERS:

A large function of the Office of Student Activities is to support, advise, and mentor our student organizations. Student organizations have gradually increased over the years. Prior to COVID-19, we had 57 organizations; however, membership declined each year from 2016 to 2019.

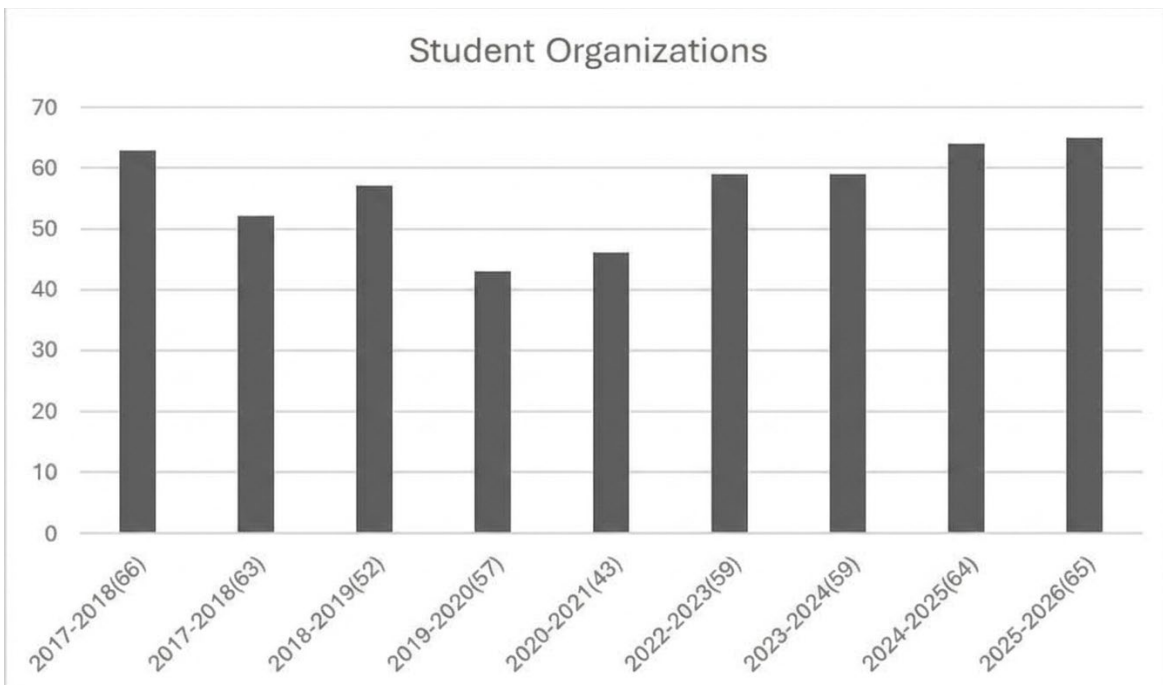
Since returning to campus in Fall 2021, the number of student organizations has steadily grown—from 43 in 2020–2021 to 46 in 2021–2022. OSA then held steady at 59 active organizations between 2022-2024.

In 2024-2025, OSA saw a 9% increase, bringing the total to 64 active organizations.

- The numbers between 2016-Fall 2023 reflect Club Sports, which were housed in OSA until they transitioned to Campus Recreation.
- The number 64 reflects only student organizations and the two Greek governing councils.

This number does not include Fraternities/Sororities.



The Office of Student Activities completed two rounds of new student organization applications this academic year. Applications are accepted from April 1–May 1 for the fall semester and November 1–December 1 for the spring semester. A total of seven new organizations were granted recognition. The approval and onboarding of these groups are managed by the Coordinator of Office Operations.

As of now, 10 applications have been submitted for Fall 2026 and are currently under review.

STUDENT ORGANIZATION PROPOSAL/RECOGNITION:

The process for creating a new student organization consists of two parts: a proposal stage and a review stage. To submit a new student organization proposal, the following information must be submitted:

1. Student Organization Title and Mission Statement
2. Constitution
3. Roster of a minimum of 10 active students interested in starting the organization
4. Proposed Executive Board Officers (President, Vice President, Treasurer, and Secretary)

Once a proposal is submitted, there are several layers of review that occur. Once it is confirmed that the proposed officers are eligible to hold a position, the Constitution is then reviewed for consistency, appropriateness, and overall legitimacy. The organization must be in line with OSA, FSC, and NYS policies and should not be duplicative of another organization already existing. A series of meetings would be held with the proposing students to fine-tune their Constitution and assess their expectations for the organization. Organizations are not required to meet SGA guidelines for funding and can exist with different sources of financial support. Once a proposal is approved, the organization will move to the Registration process.

APPROVED ORGANIZATION REGISTRATION:

Each semester, all approved organizations use the Registration process to communicate their intention to be active (holding meetings, planning events, accessing any budget, etc.). The incoming President (or Primary Contact) submits the registration form in the organizations' RamCentral portal. In this step, the organization's president or primary contact will indicate who the executive board officers will be, declare a Primary Advisor, and upload the organization's updated constitution. We highly encourage additional officers and/or co-positions to increase students in leadership positions and aid in transitions of leadership.

Once this step is complete, the OSA staff will review each student officer for eligibility. We require that all officers be in “good standing” with the college. Any officer who is ineligible is informed directly by the OSA staff. Any organization registration will not be approved until all officers are eligible to hold the position. Organization leaders have until the advertised deadline to complete this process. Although the exact date fluctuates, the deadline is always the Friday of the 6th week of the semester.

Executive Board members must complete four training items for their organization to be considered “active”.

- **Executive Board Orientation:**

- This training is conducted live and is required for all new officers.
- Sessions are offered in-person and remotely via Google Meet depending on weather cancellations.
- Officers are given administrative access to their portal once their training is completed.
- Fall 2025 – six sessions held
- Spring 2026 – seven sessions held

- **Title VI Training (per SUNY mandate):**

- Every student organization Executive Board officer is required to complete this training once during their time at FSC.
- This training is available to all students on Brightspace

- **Sexual Assault Prevention Training (per SUNY mandate):**

- Every student organization Executive Board officer is required to attend a session once during their time at FSC.
- All sessions are facilitated in person by Kathleen Flynn, Title IX coordinator.
- Fall 2025 – seven sessions held
- Spring 2026 – seven sessions held

- **Event Coordinator Training**

- This training is conducted live and is required for all first-time Event Coordinators. Returning Event Coordinators may complete an online module as a refresher.
- Sessions are offered both in-person and remotely via Google Meet depending on weather cancellations
- Fall 2025 – four sessions held
- Spring 2026 – seven sessions held

- **Student Government Financial Tutorial:**

- During the 2021-2022 academic year, the SGA Accountant created and implemented a financial tutorial that is required by all SGA funded organizations to complete. OSA/SGA require presidents and treasurers to complete this training to ensure they are aware of all policies regarding SGA allocated funds
- 454 financial tutorials were completed. This number is higher than the other two training courses because these students must complete the tutorial annually. The other two courses are only required once during their time as an Executive Board Member.

To earn and maintain an “active status”, a student organization must meet the following criteria:

- Have a minimum of a 4-person Executive Board that minimally consists of a president, vice president, secretary, and treasurer where all officers have completed all necessary officer training components
- Maintain a roster of 10 Farmingdale State College students (including the executive board)
- Hold at least one general membership meeting or event per month.

Each student organization is assigned to one of the OSA staff members to serve as a “Program Advisor”. A “Program Advisor” is there to guide organizations in the event planning and organization administration processes. All paperwork related to this process is found and submitted via RamCentral (Engage), an online network. This staff member will be the main point of contact between the organization and the OSA.

For the past few spring semesters, we have offered a “Lunch and Learn” officer transition session. 32 new and returning officers attended the session held on May 12, 2026. This allowed incoming officers to begin completing their required training sessions as well as provided an opportunity to connect with their Program Advisor in the OSA. The intention with this session was to allow students an opportunity to get their questions answered and begin the process of re-registration early to reduce unnecessary stress once the fall semester starts. The session was highly successful, and our student officers appreciated the proactive information.

ADVISOR HANDBOOK AND AGREEMENT

Added in the Spring of 2026, OSA introduced an “Advisor Handbook and Agreement” for Faculty/Staff Advisors for our student organizations. The agreement/understanding serves as an outline of responsibilities and campus policies that come with being a Faculty/Staff Advisor of a student club. It also explains to the advisor the difference between a Program Advisor and a Faculty/Staff Advisor. Faculty/Staff Advisors then acknowledged their role via electronic signature in RamCentral.

The feedback from faculty was positive, and we plan to continue with this handbook for the following semesters. As of Spring 2026, 46 of 65 organizations have Faculty/Staff Advisors.

STUDENT ORGANIZATION EVENTS:

- Total Student organizations events in RamCentral (OSA Branch):1503, which is a 22.49 % increase over 2024-2025. This includes advertising tables in the Campus Center.
- Popular categories are Meetings, Game Night/DIY, Multicultural/ Diversity, Guest Speaker, Outdoor Event, and Party.
- Events often fall into more than one ‘category’; events can only be assigned one ‘theme’

OFFICE OF STUDENT ACTIVITIES EVENTS:

Our Student Programming Assistants have become pivotal to the success within Student Activities. Starting in 2021, Student Activities has hosted 4-8 students to assist with event planning and execution, manage event-related purchases and key elements of our events, and social media efforts. OSA employed eight students in Fall 2025 and seven students in Spring 2026, with an average of 10-15 hours per week. As student roles are refined, Student Activities will host a team of 5-6 Student Programming Assistants – three of which will be returning from this past year.

Increased social media and marketing efforts have been a major focus throughout the past year. The office’s Instagram account is the most active FSC page, with continuously growing engagement and following. Over the past year, OSA’s Instagram following increased 21.1% to just under 5,500 followers, up from 4,500 at the end of last academic year. OSA’s marketing materials this year have allowed us to further promote the involvement opportunities offered through the office. The semesterly flip calendar has been continued and expanded to include the full Division of Student Affairs, as well as brochures to promote our student clubs, Fraternity & Sorority Life, and Student Government.

For the first year, our previous Farewell to Farmingdale shifted to the end of the Fall semester, as a Winter Gala with an attendance of 240 students. Hosted at the Heritage Club at the Bethpage Golf Course – the event was a great success and set a high standard for the event moving forward.

The Office of Student Activities finished the academic year as always, with our annual carnival and concert, RamChella. This year welcomed Jay Sean as the opener and Big Sean as the headliner. New this year, we added 2 hard rides for a total of six featured hard rides, a game trailer, and a prize tent filled with branded merchandise. Based on student feedback from the previous year, we made multiple changes to the event including extending the carnival to run an extra hour and working with ASC to extend shuttle service hours and providing drinks throughout the event. We reworked wristband pick up to ensure a smoother process. This included extended pick-up times and adding seven staff volunteers from different areas of campus to aid in cutting down lines and checking students in through RamCentral to ensure the most accurate headcount. We were also able to accommodate our most requested addition to the event: guests. The first 500 students to RSVP and pay a \$10 fee were permitted to bring a guest to the event. We recorded our largest attendance yet of 2,023 students and 425 guests, for a total attendance of 2,448.

Looking forward, as continued collaborations develop between the greater Division of Student Affairs and are furthered within the Office of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusive Excellence, the OSA team plans to continue to expand their efforts of positive and meaningful engagement with the Farmingdale student community. As annual events continue to evolve and grow, there is a focus on ensuring diverse opportunities and experiences reflective of the diverse population on campus.

The Office of Student Activities is committed to building a positive student experience by providing opportunities for connection and growth outside of the classroom setting. With a total of around 100 programs throughout the academic year, OSA was able to host 50 events in the Fall and another 50 in the Spring. From self-care nights to food trucks and campus-wide celebrations: events have consistently grown and expanded the community-driven impact felt on campus.

STUDENT GOVERNMENT ASSOCIATION:

The Student Government Association is in its 14th year of existence on campus and has been a 503C, not for profit since 2019. The Student Government Association experienced a number of successes throughout the academic year but also some interpersonal group dynamics that presented a number of challenges.

SGA maintained strong and consistent membership throughout the academic year, with 16 of the 17 Senate seats filled at nearly all times. Beyond their roles within student government, SGA members demonstrated exceptional campus engagement. Collectively, they held 15 president or vice president positions across various student organizations, served as treasurers for four groups, and took on secretarial roles in four others.

Additionally, SGA's presence extended into key areas of campus life, with members actively involved in Fraternity and Sorority Life, Residence Life, and NCAA Athletics—reflecting the organization's broad representation and commitment to leadership across the campus community.

SGA's approach toward shared governance was evident. This year, SGA members held committee membership in the Multicultural Committee, Student Affairs Student Services Committee, Health and Safety Committee, First Generation Committee, ASC Board of Directors, RFP Committees for the Bookstore and dining provider and the Aramark Food Committee.

SGA hosted a variety of impactful events throughout the academic year, fostering community, collaboration, and leadership development. Highlights included: the SGA Grand Assembly, an important gathering where all student organizations convene to receive updates and engage with SGA leadership. During the Spring 2026 semester, SGA partnered with Aramark Dining to host our first-ever student catering showcase so student organizations can have a better understanding of the catering process.

During the Spring semester, the SGA held an end of the year celebration at RPM Speedways followed by a meal at Korean Hot Pot.

SGA proudly sponsored 2 tables at the Farmingdale Foundation's President's Gala. By adding a second table, SGA was able to support more student scholarship money and include student organization officers on a first-come, first-served basis to attend the event.

SGA ELECTIONS:

Student Government Elections were held in early April, and voter turnout decreased by 53 percent. This can be attributed to a lack of contested elections, and we were not on a MSAF voting year.

As per SUNY 3900 and 3901 policy: each state-operated campus needs to vote every 2 academic years whether to keep the Mandatory Student Activity Fee (MSAF) mandatory or voluntary.

At the conclusion of the Spring 2026 elections, we had 14 of 17 senate positions filled. The SGA E-Board has the authority to appoint vacant positions to fill the senate. The E-Board has spent the summer advertising open spots and will make appointments by August 1st.

The SGA gifts the campus an annual “gift” every year. This year's gift was a partnership with both Athletics and Campus Recreation. Three Stairmasters and three treadmills were purchased for the free gym in the front of Nold. This was an extremely necessary investment by all three parties as the equipment in the gym was 15 plus years old.

FSC’s SGA remained actively engaged with the SUNY Student Assembly throughout the year. In November 2025, SGA proudly sent a delegation of 8 students to the Fall Conference in Syracuse. This commitment continued in the Spring, with 6 students attending the April 2026 conference.

Additionally, outgoing SGA Executive Board Members Michelle Torres, Natasha Jones, and Brionna Babcock represented Farmingdale at SUNY Advocacy Day, ensuring FSC’s campus voice was heard at the state level.

Several SGA members attended Molloy University's local Student Government Association summit held in November of 2025. This is an opportunity for all SGA's in the areas to come together and share ideas, learn from one another and host educational workshops.

SGA’s budget has seen strategic increases across several key areas for the 2025–2026 academic year. These enhancements include expanded financial support for Residence Life, DEI initiatives, and large-scale campus programming. During the spring semester, the SGA Accountant met with the College Controller to review and align fiscal priorities.

Beginning in Fall 2025, SGA expanded its financial support to include the Health and Wellness Center, Writing Center, RAM Program, and the Center for Academic Success and Tutoring, reflecting our continued commitment to advancing student success, well-being, and engagement. Building on this investment, SGA will further strengthen its partnership with the College during the 2026–2027 fiscal year by providing funding for the new Student Success & Advisement Center and supporting the Distance Learning Office. These investments underscore SGA's dedication to enhancing the student experience, increasing access to critical support services, and ensuring that all students have the resources necessary to succeed.

Outside of line items in the SGA budget- SGA was able to fulfill additional funding to support several existing programs and new programs including guest speakers Gaten Matarazzo, Aly Raisman & Laurie Hernandez, Carnival of Cultures, and AAPI Affinity Group’s Lunar New Year.

STUDENT GOVERNMENT ASSOCIATION FINANCES:

The chart below shows the paperwork that has been processed via Student Government’s Accountant Debra Ciancio and Accounting Assistant, Rob Jacobsen. The two of them serve as the financial management department for SGA serving as the association’s CPA, Accounts Payable, and Accounts Receivable among many other duties. The Director of Student Activities and SGA Treasurer approve EAFs and REQs.

Terminology:

EAF: Expense Authorization Form- each purchase must have a pre-approved EAF “attached” to it.

REQs: Requisition: Settlement of purchase. This is either done via a paper check or an online purchase using the PEX card. PEX are debit cards that are managed by the SGA Accountant.

- *Pex usage has increased dramatically due to the ease of using a debit card as opposed to waiting for a check*

REQ's paid with PEX Card, although convenient, creates significantly more work due to the following:

- Each PEX REQ requires an Additional process and form to Request Funds that are put on to the individual Program Advisors Card
- Purchases/Postings on PEX Account need to be verified/confirmed
- Each PEX REQ can contain multiple purchases, multiple vendors and time delay postings
- PEX consists of 2 Accounts- Bank and Card Balance which needs to be reconciled monthly- this includes individual activity on 7 Cards.

REQ's paid by check are usually for one vendor unless it is a reimbursement or for SGA Stipends.

Additional Fund Request implemented as a means for clubs to access funds beyond their approved budget and fund new clubs.

FRATERNITY/SORORITY LIFE:

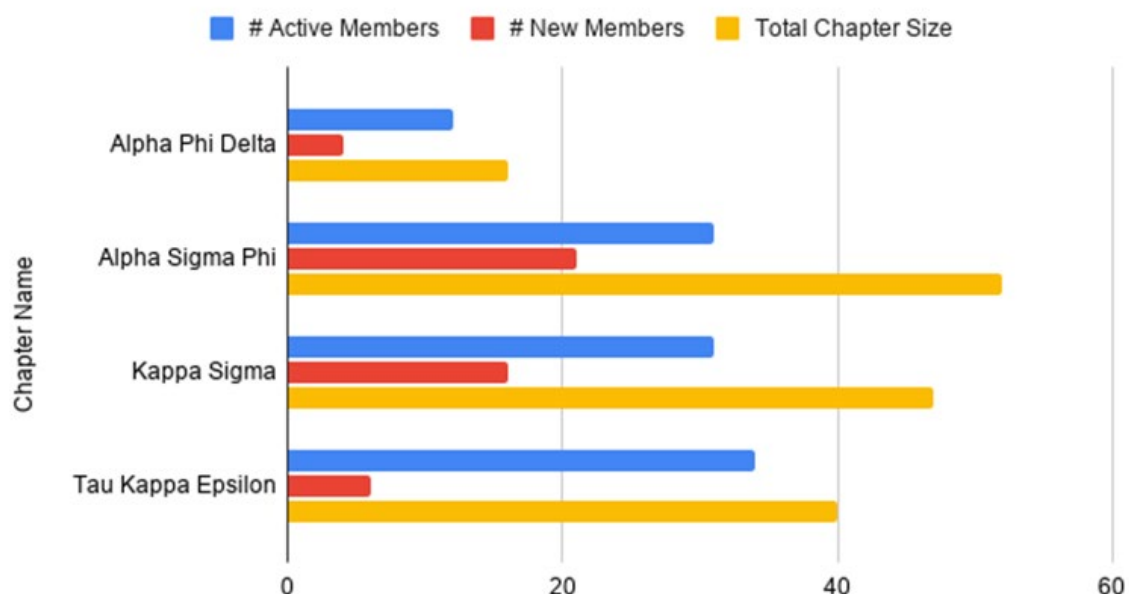
Fraternities and sororities continue to make tremendous contributions to campus life. With each new chapter, students get a new option to get involved in a student organization and participate in community service.

Fraternities

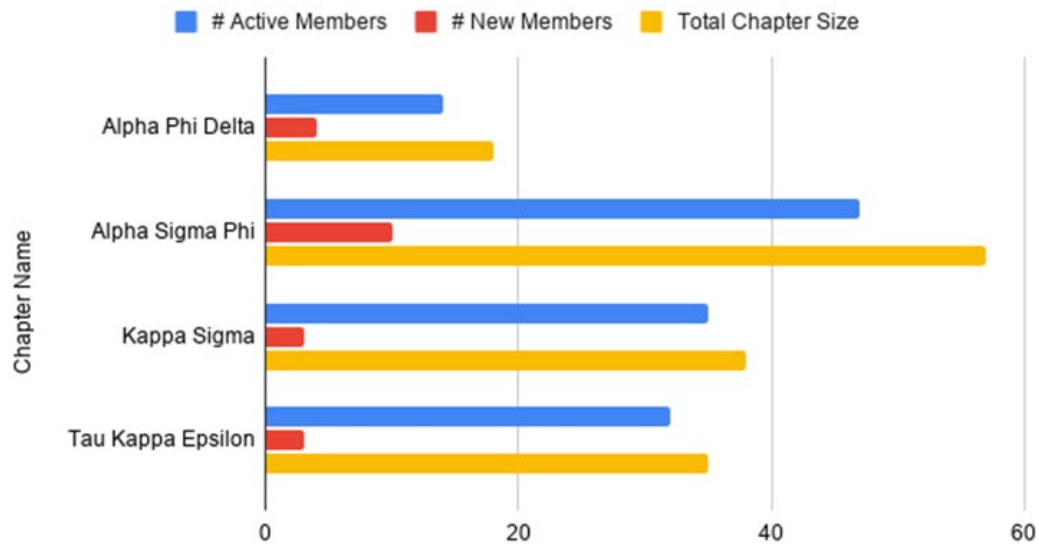

Fall 2025 Fraternity Membership



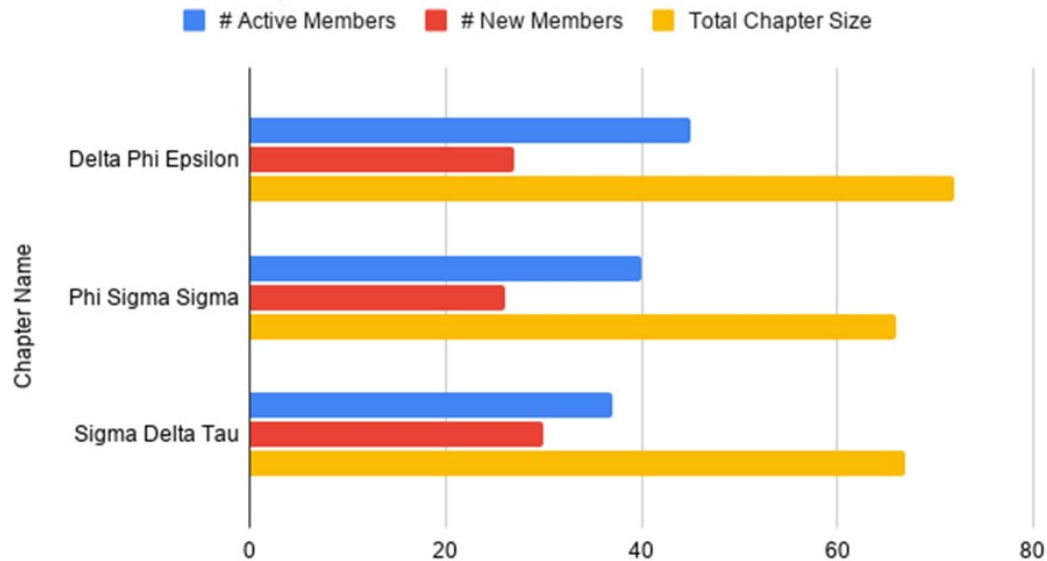
Spring 2026 Fraternity Membership



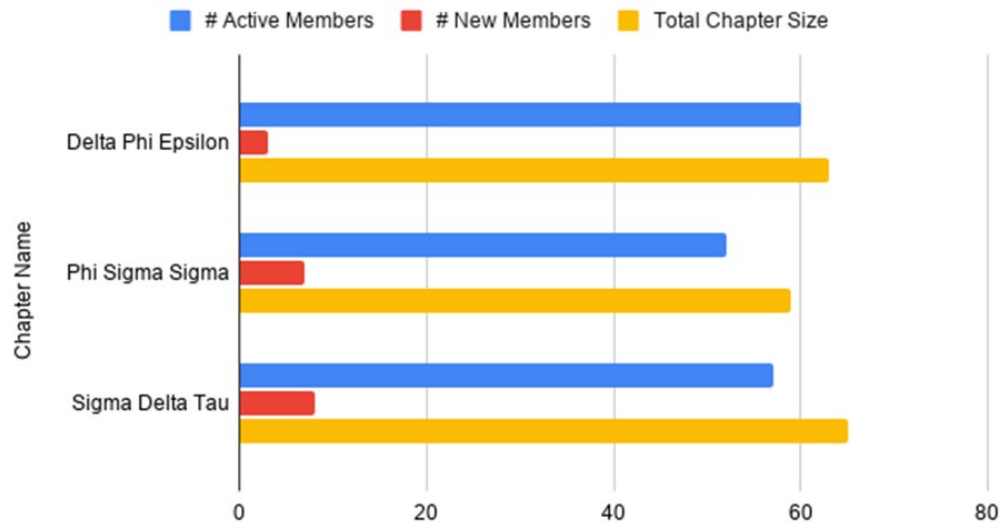
Sororities

Farmingdale's Fraternity/Sorority Community maintains strong participation.

Fraternity/Sorority Life is ending the 2025-2026 academic year with 335 active members of Fraternity/Sorority Life up 6% from the previous Spring 2025 semester. This year the community welcomed 168 new members across all 7 organizations. The Office of Student Activities is excited to see what the future holds as our community continues to grow.

Starting Fall 2025, the new member paperwork included a section on how they first heard of the Fraternity/Sorority Life community. The chart below indicates social media and Orientation as the two strongest recruitment sources.

As of August 1st 2026, the FSL community is returning with 255+ members before Fall 2026 recruitment begins.

Fraternity/Sorority Life members have expanded their involvement outside of their organization with many members sitting on various committees across campus, involvement in other clubs/programs on campus and multiple members seeking on campus employment.

This was the first full academic year of using our Anti Hazing Education Program “Prevent Zone” by Alivetek. All 168 new members were responsible for completing the course prior to joining their respective organizations. It was also required education for all Chapter Presidents and New Member Educators.

Each new member is also required to attend a sexual assault prevention workshop hosted by the Title IX office. This academic year we have offered 22 sessions.

In collaboration with the Title IX office, the Office of Student Activities brought in a sexual assault prevention speaker on April 8th. Marlee Liss came to campus to speak about her story and her survivorship. Over 60% of the FSL community attended the event.

A continuing program that seems to yield positive results is “Greek Leadership Day”. Brought to the communities' leaders in Summer 2024, Will Finnegan coordinates with Campus partners (Health and Wellness, Title IX and Counseling center) to speak to the incoming leaders on their responsibility as leaders within their organization. Will also brings in guest speakers from the FSL speaking background to speak on the topic of leadership. The program is designed to educate, inspire, and empower the various leadership teams as they head into the Fall semester.

This past winter we sent 4 Panhellenic women to the Northeast Greek Leadership Association’s Annual Conference, in Pittsburgh Pennsylvania. NGLA is where fraternal leaders come together for an inspiring and transformative educational experience. With over 100 engaging programs to choose from including dynamic Keynote Addresses and specialized sessions for students. Participants gained the tools, insight, and motivation to lead with purpose and vision.

This year the Greek Council continued to lead the community, not only helping facilitate our annual Greek Week program but continuing to give back to the community. This year the “Greek Charity Championship” was for “Making Strides Against Breast Cancer” Research. Together, Farmingdale Fraternity/Sorority Life raised over \$18,000 as they supported patients, fund research and advocacy efforts to end breast cancer as we know it. Their efforts put them as the number 10 group out of over 1,200 teams across Long Island. Sigma Delta Tau was responsible for almost half of the total raised! For their hard work and dedication, the community was honored by the FSC Office of Community and Civic Engagement with the FSC Student Organization Award for outstanding community service.

The Order of Omega, which is an honor society for fraternity and sorority members, inducted 19 new members during the academic year, our largest class to date!

Fraternity and Sorority Life is rooted in service work. Notable service projects over the 24-25 school year include: Alpha Phi Delta's Pelt a Delt Fundraiser for Project 9-Line, Sigma Delta Tau's Fantasy Man for Prevent Child Abuse in America, Alpha Sigma Phi's State Park Cleanup, Phi Sigma Sigma's Pie-a-Phi, Kappa Sigma's partnership with the Theodore Roosevelt Foundation, Tau Kappa Epsilons "Fore the Kids" golf outing for St. Jude's, and Delta Phi Epsilons "65 Roses Gala" for Cystic Fibrosis.

For the 2025-2026 school year, the community raised and reported over \$56,000 for various charities and community outreach projects. **See final page of this report for complete totals.**

In a great showing of service and working together to achieve a common goal. Greek Life continued their tradition of their annual food drive. This year was particularly special as we were able to help 3 organizations with our food donations. For the first time since 2019 the campus hosted our "Can Castle" design competition where the organizations used 1,000 items and cans to build the best design. A portion of those 6,000 items went to our on-campus food pantry, and the remainder went to Island Harvest's main location.

The very next day all seven organizations came together to collect cans and other food items for Long Island Cares. Long Island Cares provides the local community with anywhere from 15-20,000 pounds of food each month. Together, the groups collected over 71,000 pounds of food. These items will go towards feeding the over 313,000 people (including 71,000 children) on Long Island who face food insecurity.

QUINTYNE HALL:

In addition to its programming and engagement efforts, the Office of Student Activities is responsible for the oversight and daily operations of Quintyne Hall. William Finnegan serves as the Building Manager. The facility is staffed and maintained by a team of 12 to 15 student employees.

Starting in the Fall of 2026, Quintyne will operate with new hours, Monday-Thursday 9:00 a.m. to 11:00 p.m. and Friday 9:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m. On the weekend Quintyne will be open Saturday 12:00 noon to 6:00 p.m.

Will coordinates all building work orders and serves as the primary liaison to the Office of Events Management for room and space reservations. In addition, Will coordinates with Human Resources to manage all student payroll for the department. Quintyne Hall also serves as a recreational and social hub, featuring multiple gaming stations, a pool table, four arcade machines, and two "Infinity Massage Chairs" donated by the Mental Health and Wellness office, providing a welcoming and dynamic environment that supports both relaxation and engagement.

During the Spring of 2026, some significant enhancements were made to Quintyne Hall as part of a broader effort to revitalize the student experience in one of our primary campus hubs.

Originally opened in summer 2017, the building had a designated “Meditation/Prayer space”.

Through the Mental Health First Aid Grant Program, OSA was able to refurbish and create new space. The current meditation space will be rebranded as a dedicated “Interfaith Prayer” space and the current “Veterans Study Lounge” will be rebranded to a “Break Space” designed for students who are overwhelmed/need a break to go to where they can color, decompress and just relax before heading back to class.

RAM-BO

In the Spring 2025 semester, the management and support of our beloved mascot,

Ram-Bo, transitioned from the Office of Campus Recreation to the Office of Student Activities.

This shift allowed us to increase Ram-Bo’s presence at campus events and capitalize on the growing role of social media to further engage the campus community.

The entire team has contributed to ensuring Ram-Bo’s success, from coordinating staffing and serving as handlers to managing last-minute transport requests. The hands-on management of Ram-Bo requires professional staff to be present at various events, often during evenings and weekends, ensuring his presence adds value and excitement to campus life.

ASSESSMENT

During the Spring 2026 semester, the Office of Student Activities conducted an assessment of the Fraternity and Sorority Life (FSL) community. Results indicate high satisfaction in belonging, safety, and overall experience, with identified opportunities for improvement in communication, inclusion, and cross-chapter collaboration.

The survey was distributed to all 350 active members of Fraternity and Sorority Life, with 286 responses received, yielding an approximate 82% response rate. This high level of participation provides strong confidence in the validity and representativeness of the results.

Key Highlights:

- 92% of respondents agreed or strongly agreed that they feel welcomed and included within their chapter.
- 91% of respondents indicated that their chapter creates an environment where individuals with diverse identities feel respected.
- 92% of students reported agree or strongly agree that they are enjoying their time in Farmingdale State College Fraternity/Sorority Life.
- 98% of respondents reported feeling safe attending chapter events.
- A majority of respondents (58%) indicated they are likely or highly likely to pursue leadership roles in the future.

While overall satisfaction remains high, qualitative responses suggest opportunities for improvement in:

- Communication and transparency from leadership
- Inclusion and reducing “clique” dynamics
- Expanded programming and inter-organizational collaboration

Across all measured domains, results indicate a consistently positive member experience within Fraternity and Sorority Life. High agreement rates were observed in core areas such as belonging, inclusivity, leadership communication, safety, academic support, and overall satisfaction. Leadership participation and future leadership interest data suggest a healthy and sustainable leadership pipeline within the community.

Conclusion

Based solely on quantitative assessment data, Fraternity and Sorority Life at Farmingdale State College demonstrates strong performance across student experience, safety, leadership, and engagement indicators. These findings provide clear evidence of program effectiveness and offer a strong foundation for continued assessment, strategic planning, and institutional reporting.

LOOKING AHEAD TO 2026-2027

The success of the Office of Student Activities despite some challenges has had a highly successful year.

Looking forward to next year, the Office of Student Activities hopes to increase Fraternity/Sorority recruitment numbers to 170 new members across our 7 organizations.

In a continued effort to showcase our student-led clubs/organizations, the office is working on designing and purchasing banners to hang in Quintyne Hall. These banners will provide visitors with a glimpse into student life and everything Farmingdale has to offer.

Moving forward, the office hopes to continue to expand and further develop its programming through intentional marketing and social media engagement. The office is expecting a minimum of 50 events each semester, despite a reduction in the number of Student Programming Assistants moving forward. Social media and marketing are a continued focus, with a goal of 6,000 followers by the end of the 2026-2027 academic year.

After a lengthy review of SGA operational by-laws and financial by-laws, both documents are ready to be sent to the full Senate for ratification. This will be the first review in over 7 years of both documents.

As mentioned above, we look forward to gaining some space back in Quintyne Hall. The current meditation space will be rebranded as a dedicated “Interfaith Prayer” space and the current “Veterans Study Lounge” will be rebranded to a “Break Space” designed for students who are overwhelmed/need a break to go to where they can color, decompress and just relax before heading back to class. We will also hope to launch a "club hub" which would allow student organizations a meeting/resource space to conduct organization business.

The biggest challenge OSA/student groups/Greek Life faces is space.

There have been challenges that are consistent throughout the years. There is always a struggle to secure large programming space. Space, especially large ones, is lacking on campus. The Campus Center Ballroom is one of the most sought-after event spaces on campus. One set up is permitted in the ballroom per day, limiting the number of groups that can use the space. The other struggle is that offices book the ballroom and then seem to cancel at the last minute, or they could have been accommodated in a classroom space.
